WELCOME TO FABULOUS LAS VEGAS!

Clark County, Nevada received an average increase of 64,438 to its population every year of the 1990's. This population explosion dubbed Las Vegas the "fastest growing Metropolitan in the nation." With favorable cost of living, strong economic and business opportunities and low overall taxes, Las Vegas continues to boom through the new millennium.

Focusing on education, community programs, transportation and youth, Las Vegas continues to welcome the rapid growth in population the county has seen the past ten years.

LOCATION

Las Vegas is the County Seat of Clark County, Nevada and has the official airport elevation of 2,174 feet above sea level. Las Vegas is 290 miles northeast of Los Angeles, 378 miles northwest of Phoenix, 675 miles southeast of San Francisco, and 447 miles south of Reno.

TAXES

Las Vegas has **NO PERSONAL INCOME TAX**. There is no state income, inheritance, gift or estate taxes.

Inventory or corporate taxes are levied. The low overall taxes have made Las Vegas a hot-spot for industrial and professional growth.

The Clark County Assessor's Office Determines the taxable value of each parcel of land - improved or unimproved. This value is multiplied by 35% to acquire the assessed value of the property.

Property taxes are figured by multiplying the assessed value by the tax rate, which for the 1999-2000 tax year was an average of \$3.64 per \$100 of assessed value. Payments are made quarterly and due as follows:

- 1st Quarter**
3rd Monday of August
- 2nd Quarter**
1st Monday of October
- 3rd Quarter**
1st Monday of January
- 4th Quarter**
1st Monday of March

HEALTH CARDS

Health Cards are mandatory for all food/beverage handlers, tattoo technicians, child and adult care attendants, or message therapists.

In order to acquire a Health Card, you must complete an application form. For a food handler card, applicants will receive a Hepatitis A vaccination. Applicants needing Child Care or Adult Group Care Card, will receive a Hepatitis A vaccination as well as having a skin test or x-ray for Tuberculosis. All applicants must also attend an hour and a half class and movie within 30 days of applying for a health card. A temporary card will be issued until the class is completed. The cost for a Health Card is \$30 for a three year issuance. For additional information, contact:

TECHNIQUES OF ALCOHOL MANAGEMENT (TAM)

Anyone who sells, gives away, move around or make a major decision regarding alcohol, as well as Security Officers must have a valid TAM Card. CLARK COUNTY HISTORICAL TIME LINE

EDUCATION

As the 8th largest district in the country, Clark County School District has a 1999-2000 enrollment of 217,139 students - up 6.6% from the previous school year.

With such a large number of students, the Clark County School District offers a variety of programs in addition to its average curriculum. Special programs and services are available for the handicapped and retarded children, bilingual programs, classes for the academically challenged and advanced placement and honors programs.

The Clark County School District estimates that it will spend 3.5 billion dollars now through the year 2008 for improvements on the existing 238 County schools, new computer systems and books, two bus yards as well as the construction of 88 more schools to accommodate the growing number of Clark County students.

ACCOUNTABILITY REPORTS

As part of education reform in Clark County schools, the School Subject now provide Accountability Reports. The report furnished each spring to parents include statistics about a school's performance as well as achievements, highlights, awards, goals and technology use. Accountability Reports on all schools are also available online from the Clark County School District's web site www.ccsd.net.

AGE REQUIREMENTS

School attendance is required for children 7 to 17 years of age as mandated by Nevada State Law. As of the 1999-2000 school year, students about to enter 1st grade must have attended a state-approved kindergarten program or take a development assessment test. A child must be 5 years of age on or before September 30th to attend kindergarten and 6 years of age on or before September 30th to attend 1st grade.

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION

22 credits are required for high school graduation for students who entered the 9th grade after August 1, 1999. The class requirements are listed below:

7 credits	Electives
4 credits	English
3 credits	Math
2 credits	Science
2 credits	Physical Education
1 credit	US History
1 credit	US Government
1 credit	Computers
1 credit	World History or Arts/Humanities
1 credit	Health

Students who wish to graduate early and entered the 9th grade after August 1, 1999, may earn an advanced diploma by completing the 22 credit curriculum and take an additional science and social studies class for a total of 24 credits.

Students who entered 9th grade before August 1, 1999, must earn 22 credits as listed above, except students must take 2 math credits and 8 elective credits.

BUS SERVICES

Students who live more than 2 miles from zoned schools are eligible for bus transportation. Those who are eligible must fill out an application form requesting the service. The forms are available through the Clark County School District. Bus times and route schedules can be obtained through your child's school.

Students with zone variances will **NOT** be bused. Parents will be responsible for the child's transportation to and from school.

ENROLLMENT

In order to enroll students:

- * Parents must have proof of immunizations before classes begin.
- * Parents enrolling their children in a District School for the first time must have identification, child's social security number, and two forms of proof of address. Proof of child's identity can be the original birth certificate, baptismal certificate or a passport. Identification must be an original - copies are not accepted. The required proof of address can be a recent utility bill, rent receipt, residence lease or sales contracts. Telephone bills, cable bills and driver's license are not accepted as proof of address.
- * All students transferring from another school district require transcripts or report cards from the previous school.

IMMUNIZATIONS

Nevada State Law requires immunizations prior to the start of class. Required immunizations are:

4 DPT shots (one more if last dose was given before 4th birthday)

3 Polio Doses (One more if last dose was given before 4th birthday)

2 MMR Shots (One dose must be given before the 1st birthday - the second between kindergarten and 1st grade.)

These immunizations are free with proof of age at the Clark County Health Department.

MEALS AT SCHOOL

All schools provide students the opportunity to purchase breakfast and hot lunches. Elementary schools average \$.70 for breakfast and \$1.30 for lunches, while mid-level schools are \$.80-\$1.00 for breakfast and \$1.95 for hot lunches. For students in kindergarten through the 8th grade, applications for free or reduced-price meals can be found at the school's office or cafeteria.

TRANSPORTATION

Students and active duty personnel (including family members) do not need to register their vehicles or acquire a new license in Nevada as long as the individual is **not employed in the State of Nevada**. Vehicles must be currently registered with the home state with valid insurance and driver's license.

Out-of-state drivers licenses and vehicle registrations can be used by new residences for up to 30 days or before the prior items expire, whichever ever comes first. At any time during that 30 days, they may be turned in to the DMV for Nevada documents.

New Nevada Vehicle Registration:

Documents needed to register are the **ORIGINALS** of:

- Most recent registration
- Out of State plates
- Nevada emissions control certificate (smog check)
- Nevada Proof of Insurance
- Nevada vehicle inspection certificate (VIN check)
- Certificate of Title if ownership is changing. If not changing ownership, the owner has the option of retaining the out-of-state title.
